hristmas is a time to enter into the wonder and mystery of God's love for us. Instead of an army, He sends a carpenter, Joseph, and Mary, a young virgin. Instead of a mighty warrior clad in armour, He sends a newborn baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and laid in a manger. Instead of reducing

us to fear and trembling, He inspires us to rise up in love. His little arms are open to receive us with love beyond measure.

Do we really believe that God loves us with all our flaws, faults and shortcomings? Yes, that is the message of Christmas. That is the message of the stable, of the star and the angels. God loves us more than we can ever imagine!

The Gospel for the Mass on Christmas morning reveals to us that Jesus is the light of the world, a light which shines in the darkness, a darkness that was not able to overcome it. (John 1:5) May each of us allow this light to penetrate into the depths of our heart, so as to live in the light of truth. We also hear that Jesus is the fullness of God of which we have

all had a share. May God's goodness and strength fill us. Lastly, the Gospel proclaims Jesus as the Word made Flesh, who pitched His tent among us. (John 1:14) He came down from Heaven so that He might abide with us always. Jesus also wants to make a manger of our hearts. He seeks a home in our souls. ach year, we recall that when Jesus was born in Bethlehem, the Magi coming from the Orient arrived in Jerusalem saying: "Where is the infant King of Jews? We saw His star rising and we have come to pay Him homage." (Mt. 2:2) They had to set out on an adventure with a single guide: a star in which they placed their trust. The star had led them to Jerusalem, where the Gospel of St. Matthew tells us that the counsellors of Herod searched the Scriptures and found that "the Messiah was to be born at Bethlehem in Judea" (Mt. 2:5). With this prophetic promise and the light of the star, they contined on their way.

Not long after, they arrived at the place where the child has been born. At the sight of the child and His mother, they were overcome with great joy. Falling to their knees, they paid Him homage and offered Him gifts. Afterwards, they withdrew from there, returning to their country by another way.

When we visit a church or a chapel to meet Jesus, there is a "star", a reason which leads us there. We set out, then led by the Word of God, we are able to see Jesus. He whom we do not see with our human eyes, allows us to see with the eyes of faith and become believers.

"This is my Body given up for you!" An interior glance throws us to our knees before Him in adoration. Jesus makes Himself present in the little host, in the Bread to give us life in Him. He tells us, "Take my life!" and live in Him. It's an effort of our faith that He asks. Believing that in adoring Him, in receiving Him in communion, we receive His thoughts and strength to love like Him. In this holy season when we remember His birth in Bethlehem, God as a little child, we can tell Him, "How much you love us!"
